Leading the American Adventure

This year's national project is raising funds for the Junior Ranger program at Yorktown National Battlefield. N.S.C.A.R. president, Katie Stanley, is Leading the American Adventure by bringing the Junior Web program to the world wide web. The Battle of Yorktown was a very important battle. It was the last battle that the British surrendered to. It was the battle that won the war for the allies. After CAR raises the funds we will be recognized by the National Park services and



National Park Foundation. Almost 330,000 children visit one of the 286 parks every year. The Junior Rangers program is starting an 18 month \$10 million campaign to support important programs for American youth. The money that N.S.C.A.R raises will help hire a web designer who will create a web page and provide badges to children that earn them when they become Junior Rangers.

Rather than tying their park experiences only to the scheduled programs, Junior Ranger Programs are designed to provide participants with the flexibility to see and interact with the park at their own pace and within the limits of their own time.

National Parks with Junior Ranger Programs:

Many National Parks offer visitors the opportunity to join the National Park Service Family as Junior Rangers. Interested students complete a series of activities during their park visit, share their answers with a park ranger, and receive an official Junior Ranger badge or patch and Junior Ranger certificate.

HEAT UP HISTORY WITH PA C.A.R.

A VISIT TO THE SITE OF THE PA STATE PROJECT AT HARRITON HOUSE

As you know, our state project is to raise money to restore bed curtains surrounding the master bed at

Harriton House. On June 30th the Conrad Weiser Society C.A.R toured two historic homes.

Our first stop was Harriton House. This house was built by Rowland Ellis a Welsh Quaker. He called his farm Bryn Mawr. Richard Harrison bought the home from Ellis and named it Harriton House. Harrison used slaves to work his tobacco farm.

Charles Thomson was the owner of the house during the Revolutionary War. Thomson did not believe in slavery so he worked his farm with paid men.

Charles Thomson served as the secretary of the Continental Congress. Thomson gave George Washington the news that he was elected the first president of the United States.

After visiting and feeding Steady, the horse, we enjoyed a picnic lunch at the Harriton House and then it was on to the next historic home.

Our next stop was Potts Grove Manor in Pottstown, home of John Potts. John Potts the elder gave his name to the area by calling it Potts Grove. The settlement would later be called Pottstown. This home was built in 1752 by Thomas Potts, son of John. It was one of the finest homes outside of Philadelphia. Potts was a Justice of the Peace and his family held a place of prominence in the area. His wife and 13 children lived at the manor until 1768.

The weather that Saturday was warm and all of us enjoyed spending the day together.



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
The American Adeventure at Eastern Regional Meeting

Firefighters' tools are necessarily limited. That's why it's especially important for you to practice forest safety!
